




## ILLUMINATING WITH LED Streetlights

LCEC began planning its light-emitting diode (LED) street lighting conversion project several years ago. Dialogues with several manufacturers took place early in the process. Products were evaluated, and analysis helped to determine:

- Compliance with the required LCEC specifications
- Visual product quality
- Apparent ease of installation and maintenance
- Experience, integrity, and solvency of the manufacturer
- Reasonable pricing options

After thorough exploration and testing during a pilot program, LCEC rolled out an LED streetlight program earlier this year.

**There are several benefits to LED lighting:**

- LEDs provide more clear and consistent light quality that can improve safety
- Anticipated fewer outages. LED lights have a life expectancy up to five times longer than traditional High Pressure Sodium (HPS) lights
- A truer white light quality, which leads to better color rendering, allowing colors to seem more natural

LCEC determined that a phased approach is the most efficient way to implement the program. When a 100-watt HPS fixture fails, it will be replaced with an LED fixture. All requests for new 100-watt lights will also be filled with an LED light.

## Understanding your bill

We strive to keep customers informed so that when the bill arrives there are no surprises. Visit [www.lcec.net](http://www.lcec.net) for energy management tools and more information about billing practices.

- Your monthly bill is determined by your kilowatt-hour usage. Usage is measured by the electric meter.
- Customers are not billed until AFTER electricity is used.
- Customers have approximately three weeks to pay the bill. Late payments are subject to a fee.
- If not paid by the due date, reminders are issued.
- When due dates are missed or payments are received late, a security deposit based on the average cost of two months of service may be assessed.
- Some customers are also charged a franchise fee or public service tax that is collected and turned over to their local government agency.

# Lose the lint to avoid **A FIRE**


Each year, an estimated 15,000 fires involving washers and dryers happen in homes throughout the United States. Clothes dryers account for over 90% of these fires, and the leading cause of these fires is failure to clean the unit (specifically, failure to clean the lint filter). Consider the following tips as a way to protect you, your loved ones, and your home.

- Have a professional install and service your dryer.
- Read the manufacturer's operating instructions for safety information.
- Never use a dryer without a lint filter.
- Always clean the lint filter, and any lint that collects around the drum, before and after drying clothes.
- Keep a watchful eye on the vent pipe to ensure that it is not obstructed and is opening during operation of the unit.
- Consider having a professional lint removal service clean your unit at least once a year.
- Never overload your dryer or leave it running when you leave your house or sleep.

**Here are just a few of the many signs that let you know it is time to clean your vent... although it should be a regular practice:**

- Your clothes aren't drying in a normal cycle of 35-40 minutes.
- There is a musty odor coming from your dryer.
- Clothes are extra hot to the touch after they are dry. Your laundry room is excessively hot when the dryer is on.

*Saving time and energy with your microwave*



The energy efficiency of different brands of microwave ovens varies, so look for the ENERGYGUIDE labels. Also consider other energy-efficient ways to cook such as Crock-Pots, toaster ovens, and electric frying pans.

Cooking with your microwave helps to reduce cooling costs in your home because you are avoiding the heat generated from a conventional oven. Microwave ovens also use between 30 and 80 percent less energy than conventional ovens. The high-frequency radio waves that penetrate the surface of food to heat water molecules inside the food can greatly reduce cooking times and energy consumption. Microwave ovens are especially efficient for smaller portions or for defrosting.
