LCEC partnered with Duke Energy and the Coastal Conservation Association (CCA) to help restore portions of the shoreline at Delnor-Wiggins Pass State Park that were damaged by Hurricane Ian. Florida's mangrove ecosystems serve a vital role in the overall health of the state's coastal estuaries.



More than 25 volunteers planted 500 red and black mangroves across a 4,400 square foot portion of the park. The mangroves were donated by Duke Energy Crystal River Mariculture Center, a hatchery dedicated to environmental conservation. Additionally, Sunshine Ace Hardware donated shovels to aid in the restoration project.

Electric rates correlate to reliable electricity. As a not-for-profit electric distribution cooperative, LCEC rates cover the cost of operations, power supply, and capital investment in the infrastructure. When an electric bill is paid, that money feeds directly back into the LCEC electric system. From maintenance to new substations to innovative technology, LCEC rates allow for electricity that members can rely on. LCEC understands the importance and necessity that electricity plays in every day life. LCEC thanks members for supporting the vision to deliver the power that energizes our community.

What is LCEC equity?

As a member, you earn equity with every electric bill. Equity is one of the things that sets cooperatives apart from investor-owned or municipal utilities. As a membership electric cooperative, LCEC does not earn profits or utilize revenues to fund non-cooperative related projects.

Every utility must collect revenue to cover expenses and plan for investment

in the electric infrastructure. Investor-owned utilities design rates to also maximize profits and pay dividends to stockholders. Municipal utilities

design rates to contribute to the general fund. LCEC rates are balanced to only cover costs, plan for growth, maintain required financial ratios, support communities, and provide reliability.

When revenues exceed the cost of providing safe, reliable power and quality service, net margins are allocated to active members proportionate to the amount they were

billed during the year. After time, a portion of this equity is retired and active and inactive members receive their share of the retirement.



Tips to Save the in your Wallet

Following are tips that are good for the environment and good for your pocket!

Switch to paperless billing.

Paper products make up the largest percentage of solid waste. Enroll through SmartHub!

Turn it off, and save more!



Turn off lights when leaving a room for 15 minutes or more.



Turn off ceiling fans when not in the room and save an average of \$85 per) year per fan.



Turn off the hot water. Save up to 80 percent of the energy required to wash clothes. Only use hot water when necessary.

Utilizing the SUN Safely and SUSTAINABLY

Please Note: Members are responsible for the minimum customer charge to support the cost of infrastructure needed when not generating their own energy. All taxes, governmental fees, and power cost adjustments apply. In addition, a kW demand charge may apply.

The LCEC Net Metering program allows LCEC customers with a renewable generation system (RGS) to offset all or part of their energy use. **Be cautious of solar companies stating to partner with LCEC.**

When evaluating if Solar Energy is the right fit for your home consider the following:

- Conduct research to evaluate systems and find reputable vendors
- Review the LCEC Net Metering Guidelines
- Complete a net metering application and interconnection agreement
- Apply for local government permitting and inspection
- Once the PV system is installed, provide inspection documentation to LCEC
- LCEC will install a bidirectional meter and provide the OK to operate the net metering system

The net energy generated by a customer will be utilized for LCEC billing calculations. Any energy banked will be carried forward as a credit to the end of the calendar year, and payable at the avoided wholesale power cost.
